Physician Training in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (PT-CAP)

What are the objectives of the proposed team?

- To deliver educational curriculae on the four key child and adolescent mental health topics which were determined from a national needs assessment in different formats in different rural and underserviced areas in Canada (Steele et al., 2012).
- To evaluate the curriculum with a specific view to look at change in physician behaviour, capacity building in rural and remote areas and change in patient outcomes.

What are the biggest challenges your proposed team has to overcome?

The biggest challenge will be delivering the curriculum in geographically diverse areas and engaging physicians in the research component of the program. In the research design we will use mixed methods including individual interviews, focus groups and quantitative measures such as surveys and we will require the physicians to not only attend the education but to complete the research methods.

The other challenge will be engaging other health care providers (e.g. ,Schools, children's mental health agencies, hospitals) in the community to participate in the research component as we would like to determine best practices for engaging community members and building community capacity in rural and underserviced areas.

Who are the key leaders in your team?

Dr. Margaret Steele, HBSc, MD; FRCPC, M.Ed

Dr. Steele is currently the Vice Dean, Hospital & Interfaculty Relations, Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry. Margaret is a Professor in the Departments of Psychiatry, Paediatrics and Family Medicine. She is a Scientist at the Lawson Health Research, Mental Health Working Group and an Associate Scientist at the Children's Health Research Institute. Throughout her career, Margaret has presented over 200 professional presentations, published numerous peer reviewed publications and received several teaching awards including the Association of Chairs of Psychiatry in Canada Award of Excellence in Education and the Canadian Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Excellence in Education Award.

What expertise, skills, resources, networks or infrastructure could your team bring as a network collaborator?

PT-CAP is a collaborative network which includes family physicians, child and adolescent psychiatrists, psychologists and social workers. The members of PT-CAP are from all ten provinces and are a combination of service providers, educators, and researchers working in community agencies, hospitals and private practice. The group has expertise in the development and delivery of education in a variety of modalities including small group teaching, didactic large group presentations and on-line modules. The group also has members who have been actively involved in the evaluation of educational curriculum and education administration.

How will your team contribute to a transformation in adolescent mental health in 5 years?

Changing current practices of family physicians , general practitioners and paediatricians (primary care physicians (PCPs)) in rural and underserviced parts of Canada so that children/youth with mental health problems will be identified early, assessed appropriately and their mental health problems will be managed effectively. Having PCPs working more effectively with their community partners will result in better interventions for children and youth with mental health problems which in turn will result in children/youth experiencing less morbidity and become happy, productive adults.
